Thank you for downloading/printing/picking up *Dinnertime Devotions: A Holy Week Vigil!* I'm hopeful that, during this unprecedented time of isolation and quarantine, we can still make use of the gifts God gives to us through His unchanging and almighty Word! From ancient times, the Church has "kept vigil" during the night before Easter. To "keep vigil" basically means...to wait. But it's not just any waiting—it's waiting with anticipation; waiting with a purpose; waiting for the most glorious words that have ever been uttered or heard: CHRIST IS RISEN! But I'm getting ahead of myself.

The historic Easter Vigil service traditionally contains a handful of Scripture readings (that essentially re-tell God's saving acts throughout the Old Testament), an opportunity for Baptisms and Confirmations, the proclamation that "Christ is Risen! He is Risen indeed! Alleluia!." Finally, the Lord's Supper is celebrated, and the people depart to their homes, refreshed to have heard such glorious good news, where they sleep in the peace of Christ until a few hours later when they rise again to celebrate the full, joyous celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord!

This year, on account of the unique circumstances under which we will be observing Holy Week and Easter, I'm inviting each of you to keep vigil with me. We will be emphasizing the Vigil readings as well as the events of Holy Week. The idea is to spread out a series of devotions over the course of Holy Week so that your waiting might have a sense of anticipation and purpose—so that you may be prepared to celebrate anew the Easter of our Lord!

In the following pages, you will find short orders of service (that can be used appropriate to the time of day your family chooses to gather), scripture readings, hymns, prayers, activities for families, questions for discussion, coloring pages for children to color while they listen, and an opportunity to wait with purpose!

Now, I know that this may seem like a daunting booklet. I know that many households don't currently have a formal time of devotions or scripture reading and prayer at their homes. If what follows is overwhelming or it feels like being "thrown in the deep end," then by all means, just use what is helpful! I wanted to have a wide variety of activities available because our congregation has a wide variety of households! And you don't have to gather around the dinner table for what follows, in case that was a concern!

If you have questions about anything in the booklet, or just want to talk, please don't hesitate to call, text, or send me an email. I'd love to catch up and to hear from each of you

Know that you are in my prayers. Know that, whether or not we gather in the sanctuary in the coming days, Christ has absolutely walked the lonely road that led to Calvary, that led to His death and burial, and that He Is Risen *for you!* May God bless you by His Word and Spirit during these days of pestilence and seclusion. And may God grant us to meet together, face to face, soon!

Notes: Today marks the first day of Holy Week. It's the day when our Lord entered His holy city in Triumph, when His opponents first began to realize that putting Jesus to death was the only way their power could remain intact. The first reading of the Vigil service is that of Creation, the very first gracious gift given by our God—namely, everything that has ever or ever will exist!

Readings: Genesis 1:1-2:3; Matthew 21:1-11 (https://tinyurl.com/ts3s4s6)



- 1. In the story of creation, which part is your favorite? Why? What are some of your favorite things in creation?
- 2. When Jesus entered Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, the people shouted, "Hosanna!" Hosanna is a word that means, "Save us now!" From what does Jesus save us? How does He do that?
- 3. Both of these accounts occur with the theme of God entering into His creation. What similarities or differences do you notice between Creation and the Triumphal Entry?
- 4. Notice the use of God's Word in the account of Creation. What do we learn about the power of His Word? How might this be Gospel (good news) for us?
- 5. Read through the Triumphal Entry account again. List the various titles given to Jesus. How do each of these differently describe who Jesus is?

Notes: On Monday of Holy Week, Jesus entered the Temple, His Father's house, to see it filled with merchants, moneychangers, and scoundrels—all seeking profit from the worship of God. In righteous anger, He overturned their tables, disrupted their livelihoods, and flooded the streets of Jerusalem with animals, chaos, and the judgment that this people had forgotten their God.

- 1. What promise does God make Noah after the flood? Does that promise still apply to us?
- 2. Today's texts help us to acknowledge God's righteous judgment against sin. How do the wages of sin still affect us today? How do we find relief from such a burden?
- 3. Note when the cursing of the fig tree takes place; how is this symbolic of the cleansing of the Temple? What was missing in the Temple? How do Jesus' words to the disciples in verses 21-22 give us hope?

Notes: Tuesday of Holy Week was a day of testing for Jesus. As He was tested by the devil after His baptism, so is He now tested and tried by each of His opponents in Jerusalem. This was also the day in which the Jews were required to examine the lambs that each household would be slaughtering for their observance of the Passover.

- 1. In the end, God didn't let Abraham sacrifice Isaac. God provided a sacrifice instead. God had promised Abraham that Isaac was going to be the
- 2. When Jesus says, "Render to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's," what did He mean? How does that affect how we live our lives?
- 3. What do Abraham's words in vs. 8, "The Lord will provide for Himself a lamb" tell us about the nature of God? How does He ultimately fulfill these words of faith?
- 4. Notice the different opponents Jesus meets in the Gospel accounts for today. What challenges are they bringing before Him? (e.g. Why are they asking what they're asking?)
- 5. Jesus' parables today are clearly spoken against His opponents. Are there any parts of the parable that don't make sense to you? Work through each one and explain what it means.



Notes: Wednesday of Holy Week is a bit of a mystery. On every other day, Jesus was busy teaching and preaching, but apparently, we have no record of Jesus' activity on Wednesday. This is potentially the day in which Judas agreed to betray Jesus, but Jesus' own activities are unknown. Today, we have three readings from the Vigil.

Readings: Isaiah 55:1-11, Ezekiel 36:24-28, Zephaniah 3:12-20 (https://tinyurl.com/szk9wyz)



- 1. Reread Isaiah 55:10-11. With what does God compare His Word? And how is His Word like that?
- 2. Ezekiel 36 talks about God giving us a new heart and Spirit. What else does God give us that's new?
- 3. What do Isaiah 55:1-3 tell us about God's favor? What do we do to earn His love?
- 4. Reread Zephaniah 3:16-20. Notice the shift in who's talking as these verses unfold. How is it significant that God is talking? What is He saying?
- 5. Theologians have noted that Jesus' actions on Holy Wednesday aren't recorded in scripture. In what ways can a time of solitude or silence benefit you spiritually?

Prayer for the Day: Merciful and everlasting God, You did not spare Your only Son but delivered Him up for us all to bear our sins on the cross. Grant that our hearts may be so fixed with steadfast faith in Him that we fear not the power of sin, death, and the devil; through the same Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Ghost, ever one God, world without end. **Amen.**



MAUNDY THURSDAY

Notes: Today is the beginning of the Holy Triduum—The "Holy Three Days." Maundy Thursday is called "Maundy" on account of the Latin word, "mandatum," from which we get the word mandate. Jesus tells His disciples, in the upper room, "A new command (mandate) I give to you; love one another." Thursday of Jesus' final week was spent celebrating the Passover, and adding something new...a new covenant—His body and His blood.

Readings: Exodus 14:1-15:1; Matthew 26:17-29; John 13-16 (https://tinyurl.com/ulcqyhj)



- 1. Who did God save His people from when they crossed the Red Sea? How did He do that?
- 2. In the scripture lessons today, one group of people's feet stayed dry, and one group of people's feet got wet? Which is which? And how does the idea of washing someone's feet make you feel? How do you think it made Jesus feel?
- 3. God saved His people through the waters of the Red Sea. Christians have traditionally looked at this as a foreshadowing of Baptism. How does the Red Sea Crossing correlate to Baptism?
- 4. It may have been a while since you read the Upper Room Discourse from John's Gospel. Reading it in one sitting, did anything surprise you? There are a number of significant and memorable verses in these chapters. Which verses have added significance, given the fact that, in less than 12 hours, Jesus will be crucified?
- 5. Pay special attention to John 15:1-11. What does it mean to be "connected to the vine?" When we are permitted to gather again as a congregation, how might we further emphasize our need to be connected to Jesus?

Activity:

Footwashing and Prayer:

While washing someone else's foot doesn't have the exact same significance as it did 2,000 years ago, it's still an uncomfortable idea for most of us. Get a towel and some warm, slightly soapy water. Wash the feet of someone in your family. While you wash their feet, pray for them (out loud) We can show kindness and humility for people and learn from Jesus to love each other.

GOOD FRIDAY



Notes: A day in which the sun refused to shine. A day of somber sadness and deep reflection. God's Son hangs on a cross, dying for the sins of mankind. "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." This day, and the days that follow, serve as a guide for all Christians—that by Christ's death, we might learn to die in faith; and by His Resurrection, we might learn to live in Him forever!

- 1. Why did Jesus have to go to the cross?
- 2. Just before Jesus died, He said, "It is finished." What was finished? What does that finishing mean for us?
- 3. The Gospels record seven words of Jesus from the cross: Luke 23:34; Luke 23:43; John 19:26–27; Matthew/Mark 15:34; John 19:28; John 19:30; Luke 23:46. What do each of these say about our Lord's love for us?
- 4. When Jesus says, "My God, my God, why have You forsaken me?" what does it mean that God forsook His Son? What comfort does that give us?
- 5. Consider your own sins. Our sins sent Jesus to the cross. They were dire enough that the life of God's Son was the only acceptable sacrifice. How is the cross God's law? How is the cross God's gospel?

HOLY SATURDAY

DINNERTIME DEVOTIONS of Holy Week Digit

Notes: "And the seventh day, God rested." Having paid for the sins of the whole world by the shedding of His blood, Jesus rested in the tomb. The disciples' hearts were broken. Everything they had come to believe had been undone over the last 24 hours. The same seemed true for ancient Israel in Ezekiel's day. Would God still redeem His people?

Readings: Ezekiel 37:1-14; Matthew 27:57-66 (https://tinyurl.com/ukgplyd)

- 1. In the Bible, the 7th day of the week is the day of Rest, called a Sabbath. Jesus rested in the tomb part of Friday, all day Saturday, and until Sunday morning. Is rest important in our lives?
- 2. Why does it say that they "made the tomb as secure as was possible?" What were they worried about?
- 3. Whose bones were in the Valley of Dry Bones in Ezekiel? What does their identity and their words mean for the people of God in Ezekiel's day? For Christians?
- 4. People often ask how Jesus was in the tomb 3 days if He died on Friday and rose on Sunday. The ancient world used "inclusive time," so that a day was counted if any part of that day was in the group of days being discussed (as opposed to our thinking of days just as 24 hour increments). Jesus' died around 3 in the afternoon on Friday and was raised sometime before sunrise on Sunday. How has "keeping vigil" been a meaningful experience for you? Has there been a sense of anticipation building over the course of the week? What reflections do you have over the past 6 days?



Notes: Christ is Risen! Have more glorious words ever been spoken? Death is defeated; Satan has lost. Christ has emptied His tomb with the promise that one day, all the tombs of the faithful will likewise be empty. Today is the reason we are Christians. Today is the pinnacle of God's saving acts throughout all time. He is the author of life, and today is the climax of the wonderful story of faith and love that He has given us.

Readings: Daniel 3:1-30; Job 19:23-27; John 20:1-18 (https://tinyurl.com/qkuab2r)



- 5 Soar we now where Christ has led, Following our exalted Head. Made like Him, like Him we rise; Ours the cross, the grave, the skies.

- 1. Jesus didn't stay dead. He is Risen! If Jesus rose again from the dead, what does that mean for people who trust in Jesus for salvation?
- 2. Who, in your life, needs to hear that Jesus died and rose for them? Can you think of a way to tell them this great news?
- 3. Read 1 Corinthians 15. What is the relationship between Jesus' resurrection and ours? How insistent is Paul that Jesus really rose from the dead?
- 4. How does Jesus reveal Himself to Mary? What promise does He give her that has implications for you and for me? What are those implications?
- 5. In some ways, every Sunday is a "little Easter," a time to reflect upon the newness of life that Jesus brings to us. The historical fact that Jesus rose bodily from the grave has real implications for us as Christians. In the midst of this time when we are unable to gather as a congregation, in what ways can we still celebrate Jesus' Resurrection? How can we remember and reflect His victory over death every day of our lives?
